

# Weathering Effects Tutorial

I often get people complimenting my weathering effects so I thought I would write a little "How to" about them. The piece I have chosen to paint is an AA Turret Platform from Max Mini

I have purposefully gone for a heavily weathered effect on this, envisaging the weapon half derelict after some long war. Anyway here's how it went.



The first step was to clean up any mould lines, flashing etc. I then assembled the base section together. I decided to keep the main body, base, and the arms all apart for ease of painting. I then primed all the sections using a Grey Primer.

The next step was to put down a base coat. I used Catachan Green. At this point I apply no shading or highlighting, simply the base colour.





We are now going to start some effects, starting with some paint chips.

For this part I created a dark brown mix, something like Scorched Brown with a little black added. Pic 1.

You also need to grab yourself a little sponge. Best thing is some of the foam that comes in most blisters. Rip it up a bit so you have a pointed end. Now you're going to dip the point into your paint mix. Then dab this onto some kitchen towel to remove the excess paint but not too much. You still want a fair amount to go onto the painting surface. Pic 2.

You now want to dab the sponge against the surface. Try thinking about your placement. Paint chipping will generally be in areas that will be rubbed or bashed. Usually this is on edges rather than in the recesses. Pic 3

Here you can see the effect. The sponge creates lots of variation in chip size. Add as much or little as you like! Pic 4.







We now need to create a 3D effect on the chips (everything is 3D's these days it seems!)

To do this there are two stages. The first is we take some diluted black paint and apply it in a thin line at the top of each paint chip. Now some chips will be tiny and I don't tend to do these if I'm not able.

After this is applied you then need to create a new mix. Take some of your basecoat and mix in some lighter colour to create a lighter variation for highlighting. We then apply a thin line of this onto the bottom edges of the chips. Now to make this effect work you need to think about this highlight and where the lighting is coming from. You only want this highlight on edges that the light source would hit, some chips this will just be the bottom edge but others may have sufficient protrusions that there are others.

You can also add further to the largest chips by applying a little metallic paint to them to show where the chips gone through the primer layer down to the bare metal.

Pic 5.

Now we are going to add in any further details like freehand insignia, etc. You could do this earlier in the process if you wish to have these chipped too but I didn't on this occasion. I also took the time to paint the cables, and other details that weren't in the base-coat colour.

I then applied Devlan Mud wash across the whole piece. You can repeat this process to build up the shading/grime as needed. Deeper recesses generally require more.

Pic 6.





I now wanted to add some details to the gun muzzles. This is to simulate the smoke,ash,etc you get from the gun firing. This also works equally well on exhausts and chimneys.

It's very simple. Just grab a dry brush and dab on some black paint to the selected area. build this up as much as you like. To apply you want to use a stippling action rather than a stroking one.

Now it's time to add some rust effects. There's two main ways to do this and I have used both on this piece. The first method is using paint.

To do this take some GW Dark Flesh and dilute it down to a wash. You then apply several layers of this around where you want the rust. This is generally in recesses and bolts, those sort of things, You can even create rust runs from bolts - simply apply a thin line downwards from the bolts/screw-head. Make the line slightly wider at the top and pointed at the end.

What you then need to do is take some Blazing Orange and stipple this into the recesses. Use this sparingly as too much will overwhelm the piece but a little adds to the rust effect and creates a nice colour interest. The beauty of the paint method is you can build it up as much or as little as you want.

The other method is the pigment one. This is actually the first time I have used them so there are probably better exponents of this method around!

I use Vallejo Pigments for this but there are others too. I did two approaches with this, the first I applied a small amount of Devlan Mud where I wished to place the pigment. I then dabbed on the pigment using an old brush. You need to be quick enough so that the Devlan Mud hasn't dried up! After doing this I left the turret to dry for half hour then I came back and applied more pigment but this time without using the Devlan Mud.

The pigment method is messy so be warned!! And then you should be left with your finished piece.

Most things we paint don't require so much weathering but this technique can be scaled down to a single weapon or even just base details. It doesn't need to be super neat and is pretty quick. Hopefully this is of use to some of you.

I love Guinea pigs. I had one when I was in middle school and he was a very awesome pet. Most people don't know this, but hand-raised Guineas aren't afraid of people like the ones you find in most pet stores... but I digress. Needless to say, this very cute and original piece from Dark Sword appeals to me in a special way. I really want to know what kind of design meeting led up to the decision of putting a quinea pig in samurai armour. I'm thinking drinking had to be

The pose is quite simple- the furry warrior standing at his ease with a naked katana laid casually over his shoulder. Now, I do have to say that it bothers me that there's no sheath for the katana on this mini. He has a wakizashi in his belt, but not the second scabbard that would be a part of the daisho. Regardless of this, the details of this mini are as crisp and clean as we have all come to expect from Dark Sword. The armour has a lot of fine details and the fur is sculpted masterfully, lending it a soft effect that I think a painter could work with easily.

This looks to be one of the easiest

to prep I have seen in a long time. Outside a couple of gate tags and a few minimal mould lines, there's no slag, gaps, or pitting. It's a pristine cast that shouldn't take long to completely prep. The separate right arm fits snugly into a slot in the body and the fit is so good you won't have to gap fill. The only bad news is that it's an attached base. You could remove it with care- it's not integrated in any way that would make it too difficult to cut away. I did find an odd round protrusion on the left side of his outer coat that may have been part of a gate. Its placement makes it a little awkward to remove



without damaging any of the surrounding details, so you'll need to be careful filing it away.

The Guinea pig looks like it would be a very fun miniature to paint, but there are a lot of details to deal with, especially on the armour. The fur is sculpted very finely, so you'll want to make sure your paint is dilute enough to not obscure the detail. The coat is an excellent opportunity for freehand design as it is the largest open space.

Dark Sword creates some very unique little critter figures, and this is no exception. There are actually a number of different Guinea pig miniatures available at their site- all but 1 are Japanese themed. This piece is definitely geared more toward collectors and painters more than gamers, but it's a great piece for anyone who loves unique and well made miniatures or Guinea pigs.

#### CAPTAIN SPROUT

This is one of Dark Sword Miniature's wide and varied range of animal characters. I last reviewed the frog mage and thought it was a great sculpt and an enjoyable figure investment so I was very much looking forward to seeing if this mini lived up to the high standards set by the last.

Guinea pigs are popular pets (we had one when I was little but my sister's introduction of it to larger pets with bigger teeth on the basis they should be friends failed to end very well) and friendly little creatures. Samurai's are popular in the mini world, so this seems an ideal, if slightly off the wall, crossover. This Guinea pig Samurai is the first of three in the Dark Sword range and there is also a Guinea pig geisha, for a bit of themed love interest.

The model, sculpted by Dave Summers, comes in the now familiar Dark Sword blister with well designed card and sturdy plastic blister and foam. As usual this means the mini arrives in the condition it was intended to be in. It's easy to gloss over packing when you have seen it before, but I think quality packing materials and good quality control are the hallmarks of an organisation bothered about what their customers receive for the hard earned cash.

In this case the Samurai comes secure in his blister in three parts; the body with head cast on, a separate arm holding a katana and a small round circle which fits on the front of the Japanese helmet to represent a crest or 'sun disk'. There is a second shorter sword on the belt of the mini (though no scabbard for the longer sword) and the pose is well conceived. There is some nice concept art on the DSM site and the mini realises the artist's idea really well. Sometimes the transition between concept art and mini sees the loss of a bit of 'soul' but in this case the mini is even more 'Guinea pig' than the art is.

The mini has well detailed Japanese armour and a Kabuto armoured hat with a large pair of curved horns. The armour could be painted as lacquered metal or leather leaving the painter and google fan lots of colour choices for any theme they might want to follow. Over the armour the mini wears a robe and the drapery on the sculpt is very well done as it lays over the sword and flows down the back of the mini. The robe allows for a bit of freehand for those painters who enjoy it and adds a sense of height and girth to the mini, clearly showing it is not a human with a Guinea pig plopped on top. The face of the mini is a highlight, it really does look like a Guinea pig and the fur is very well sculpted and detailed. A few Guinea pig reference photos will sort the painter out where the colours for the face are concerned.

The casting quality is very good with all the details well picked out. There is almost no clean-up, there are a couple of tiny casting gates and the odd very small mould line but the whole job would take less than 30 minutes. Assembly will also be very simple, with only the arm and little disk to attach. The arm has a small securing nub which matches a locating hole on the body and so just a drop of super glue should hold everything neatly in place.

All the Dark Sword minis I have had in hand have cast on bases and this one is no exception. In this case however it is unobtrusive and would be easily removed or integrated to another base if the modeller so desired. If you hate these sort of bases you can quickly get over this one!

Dark Sword minis are quite unique, there are few other companies turning out this sort of animal crossover mini. MSB toys has some Japanese themed beasties, but no Guinea pigs! Other minis in the Dark Sword range could make for a nice set if the modeller wanted a few sword wielding hairy piggies. All these minis are slightly bonkers of course, but in a good way.

There are probably not that many gaming opportunities for this sort of mini, but an enemy character or role playing Guinea pig might be fun and no doubt gamers would have more ideas for this than I have. For the painter however this mini is certainly attractive; it's not too small, it has great details, it has numerous different surfaces which draw the brush and it would reward a careful colourful paint job.

#### SHANE ROZZELL

When I first saw Dark Sword's Samurai Guinea pig I thought it was a cute model but one I'd probably not paint but having seen it in hand I might re-think that. The model is pretty big, 45mm from the bottom of the base to the top of his horns, and comes in three pieces; his right arm and sword separate from the rest of him and a separate Disc for his helmet. The fitting of the arm is pretty much perfect and hardly any need for filling which would be a bonus to the beginner painter.

The pose is pretty static but I like the way he is holding his sword over his shoulder in a proudly contemptuous manner. Like all Dark Sword miniatures this guy has an integral base but removing him this from wouldn't be too much of a hassle

as it's only his feet connecting him to it. The detail on my copy of the cast is very nice and strong with no pitting and one, simple to remove mould line that is very easy to get to. Flash metal is also at a minimum so I can see this guy being very easy to prep which is always a bonus.

Having done a quick search for samurai armour on the internet there are loads of good reference pictures to help with the colour scheme so I can honestly say I'm off to make a Japanese garden style base for this little guy.

#### NEAT PETE

It's a Bird, it's a Ninja! No, it's a Guinea pig samurai! Dark Sword's guinea pig samurai is another funky but highly detailed miniature we've come to expect from the Minneapolis based company.

The cast is very clean with only a few mould lines that should clean up with no problems with standard metal miniature preparation. There were a few flash tabs on my copy but they came off with my finger. Like the frog wizard, I'm again impressed with the depth obtained on the main torso piece. The secondary sword protrudes out the back as the handle comes out of the front of miniature leaving me to wonder how they keep their moulds from breaking down over time. Cast in three pieces: body, right arm with sword and tiny circular adornment for the front of the helmet. Careful not to lose the later as it is quite small.

The Japanese samurai armour has a copious amount of tiny details that are all very clean and neatly cast. The face, especially the fur is sculpted very fine and almost creates a personality you can see right out of the package. The kimono has a nice smooth texture that offers a nice opportunity for the painter to lay down some nice freehand or a fabric texture that has become popular among painters. Nice big round eyes also provide the chance to create a unique looking face on this unique miniature.

#### DARKLORD

Dark Sword like making animal personifications and it may seem unusual for some hobbyists it's a subject that works well and offers something different and fun.

This mini has a pretty static pose but its full of character and just entices you to paint him. The detail as always with Dark Sword's miniatures is fantastic. Sharp and crisp sculpting by D. Summers coupled with Dark Sword's excellent casting quality gives you a very nice base for painting. The piece has lots of detail but in the right places. It only uses them where warranted and isn't overloaded like so many miniatures these days. Simple well constructed miniatures are one of Dark Sword's hallmarks and that vein continues here.

Assembly is a 3 piece affair with the arm and helmet disk separate. This means prep is fairly easy and the minimal mould lines add to that ease.

Priced at \$9.99 (£6 approx) it's great value for that price and well worth paying out. Overall this is a fantastic miniature. While the subject is a little left field its one that is fun and full of character. Painters will certainly enjoy bringing this cheeky little fella' to life.

#### CONCLUSION

Another great miniature from Dark Sword that's full of fun. Delivered with a fantastic standard of sculpting and casting at a worthwhile price Even if this isn't your usual fare its worth grabbing just as a piece to paint for sheer enjoyment, you will surely be rewarded and it can't fail to put a smile on your face.

#### **Captain Sprout**

Quality: 9/10, an excellent sculpt and cast, high quality packing, high production values for this one.

Assembly: 9 / 10, a simple piece to assemble with few parts and little clean-up, the combination of clean casting and few bits means this is a simple mini to get to the painting table in good order in quick time.

Value: 9.5 / 10, the mini retails at \$9.99 (£6 approx) which is a very fair price for a mini of this quality.

Overall: 9 / 10, a quality mini that should appeal to anyone who likes a bit of fun. It's not super serious or trying to take itself to drama levels, it is what it is, a fun, well sculpted, well realised little bundle of Japanese furry goodness. If you like Guinea pigs or Japanese armour or just want a bit of amusement in a series of 'serious' minis this is one to pick up and paint.





This issue I'll be talking about my background, some of the games I play, some I'm going to be playing over the next couple of months and finally some of the future topics I'll be discussing.


hen I was asked to write a regular feature in Portal on gaming I racked my tiny brain trying to come up with a suitable topic for my first article. I went through several ideas before realising that my first should be an introductory chat about me and my gaming experience.

Now I've been playing table top games for well over 25 years, not going to give you all an exact date as that's just a little too scary. I first started way back when I was about 10 when I'd line up my unpainted Airfix miniatures and roll d6 dice at them. The ones that were knocked down were obviously killed. When I turned 11 we moved, I entered the big school, and met a friend who introduced me to D&D and Warhammer, the White Box Set, yes, I'm that old....the rest as they say is history, and before some of you cheeky sods out there say ancient history... Which is why I may have been given the job of writing this regular feature, that or I was the only daft bugger insane enough to agree to it...

I'm quite happy to inform people that I'm a geeky gamer and painter, yes I'm a rare breed of gamer who actually enjoys painting as well. Simply because I believe you should never field an army unless it has at least 3 base colours on them. I play a wide variety of games from wargames, mainly skirmish based, RPG, board games and I have to confess to only one collectable card game, the granddaddy of them Magic. I'm also a big fan of computer games, though these days I play more games online such as D&D online. Battlefield Heroes and Warhammer Online.

In recent years I've become a writer producing material for several small publishing companies such as Solway, who produced the excellent A Very British Civil War, which I've contributed to two of the current background books. Also two years ago I was insane enough to set up and edit along with Nick Johnson an on-line gaming/ painting magazine called Irregular, which has helped to open doors to the gaming industry.

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


So what am I playing at the moment, well a number of games and systems. I GM a D&D campaign using 4th edition rules. A Very British Civil War, but at skirmish and larger battle games. I use Ganehsa Games Flying Lead rules for this and I use their rule set Songs of Blade and Heroes for fantasy games, though these tend to be skirmish games, which leads me to Mordhiem,

So there's a little of my background, which gives you an idea of my experience in gaming. So what am I going to taking a look at over the next few issues. I'm going to look at some of the games/products I've managed to get my grubby little hands on. As well as take a look at some interesting aspects of gaming.



One of the recent games to land on my desk is Wizards board game Conquest of Nerath, a risk style strategy game set in the world of Dungeons' and Dragons. On the RPG front I have come across two systems/games produced by



British gaming companies. the first is Cold City by Contested Ground Studios, set in an alternative post WW2 Berlin and the second is 6D6 by 6D6 Fireball a retro clone style rule system. This is a gem of a game, simple and easy to play well worth checking out.

On the wargame front of things I don't plan to start playing

any new rules just yet as I have too much that needs painting, so I'll be slapping paint on metal and plastic toy soldiers for the next month. So what topics, issues am I going to be looking at over the next few months.

I plan to take a look at a variety of different topics, such as Alternative Wargaming, looking at the various different alternative history setting out there both free and paid for. Other topics will include looking at setting up a small publishing company or a boutique miniature one. I will also

take a look at writing your own rules set or campaign background, along with gaming clubs and the best way to go about setting up your own is.

Well that's all for this issue, a little short, but next issue I'll be looking at the world of alternative history gaming.

Minipainting Wiki is a community project set up to create a place of information on all aspects of miniature painting and it's related aspects. The content is entirely driven by you the users. Each month in Portal we will highlight some of the information people are adding to the wiki.

The more information we can gather the better, anything from details on painting contests, tools, painting and sculpting techniques, clubs, games and even famous painters, sculptors and miniature companies. You can add as little or as much as you like from a single sentence to entire pages of useful content, its all welcomed from everyone.

Here's just a few of the things added over the months.

#### **PRIMER**

A primer is a coat of paint applied to the bare surface of a miniature to create a 'key' for the subsequent layers of paint to adhere too. A primer is usually applied in aerosol form though can be applied with a brush. There are numerous colours of primers available though the most common tend to be White, Black or Grey. each has its advantages and disadvantages and painters tend to favour one or the other.

Many Paint companies produce primers specifically designed for miniature painting though non-specialist ones can be used such as car primers amongst others.

#### WHITE PRIMER

White primer was once the default approach to miniatures painting. As a key, white allows colours to show up brightly, creates powerful contrasts and, by using mutliple thin coats that allow the white primer to show through to different degrees, can achieve outstanding effects for texture and contour. However, white fell out of favour throughout the 1990s when more emphasis began to fall on, firstly, mass painting of multiple models for armies and large units and, secondly, on a darker, more moody colour palette by comparison to the bright, exaggerated colours of the 1980s. The challenge of white primer was always to ensure that all the exposed areas of pure white were concealed in the final paint-job, which was challenging to new and less-skilled painters, who preferred the "instant shading" of black primer.

However, white has begun to return to favour, particularly amongst highly-skilled display painters, for the qualities that made it originally so popular. New paint technology, techniques and materials, such as washes, oils and the increasingly ubiquitous airbrush have made white once more a popular priming colour of choice.

#### **BLACK PRIMER**

At time of writing, by far the most popular choice for priming,

black lacks the finer qualities offered to colour vibrancy and contrast by a white primer, but has the overwhelming advantage for painters of models for tabletop use of providing "instant shading," meaning that areas where the model's detail is deep can be safely ignored for the purposes of painting and left black. Black primer has also been popular with painters of display and competition models because it provides a dullness to colours, giving all palettes a natural, muted look that suits painters seeking a realistic finish to paint schemes. The innovation of the Citadel Foundation paints range of acrylic paints has also given black primer a fillip, as these high-pigment paints and their equivalents from other manufacturers can provide a sound basecoat over black that lower-pigment colours struggled to provide.

#### **GREY PRIMER**

Widely touted as an effective half-way house, providing both the advantages and disadvantages equally of black and white primer, grey has proven popular in some circles and increasingly so in the last decade up to 2010, for the same reasons as we have seen the return of white primer. Like white, grey primer requires washing and careful painting to ensure that the deepest areas are coloured. Like black, grey primer also confers a natural dullness that supports a realistic tone for bright colours.

#### MIXED PRIMING

Mixed priming is a priming technique that usually begins with black primer being sprayed all over a model. A second primer coat is then added in either white, grey or another colour, but this coat is applied lightly and sparingly, such that it settles only upon the raised surfaces of the model or models in question. Mixed priming can achieve a number of effects, the principle one being that the deep shading offered by a black primer is retained in the recessed areas, whilst the more vibrant colours offered by a white or other colour primer are attained on the upper and exposed surfaces.

# Gallery

I've been a member of WAMP for a while now, but the timing just never seemed to work out for me to enter any of the wonderful contests hosted and sponsored there. When I heard about the Dark Sword competition, I knew that I had to try to make the deadline, even if it meant staying up to work on a project till I was bleary eyed! I've been a fan of Dark Sword Miniatures since their early days, and have painted a few pieces of theirs over the years. My favorite sculpts always seem to be the Tom Meier pieces, who remains a legend in sculpting perfectly proportioned 30mm models.






I decided that the piece I would enter would be a "Lannister Lady in Waiting". I'd picked the model up last year at GenCon, and then promptly brought it home and put in it a drawer for 10 months. I'd only seen a few examples of this particular model painted up, but none of them really with a "soft" or "gentle" leel. I know that's completely anti-Lannister, but I went there with this model anyway. Her gown is painted in soft semi-transparent pinks blending to a deeper mauve/burgundy at the bottom of the gown. The dress looked too plain once the color was there, so I added a freehand design to the bodice which flows a little into the middle of the skirt. I also added the freehand trim to the hemline. I wanted to do something with water for her basing, so she's standing on a jagged rocky ledge with some teal-tinted resin lapping at the bottom.

She was truly a pleasure to paint, and it's an honor to win the first Dark Sword sponsored contest at WAMP. I hope that you all enjoy this model as much as I do!

## CITADEL MAT VARNISH COVERS IN WHITE

## Spellscape:

Hi all,

Yesterday I've tried to use my GW mat varnish spray and like 1 year ago it started to cover miniature in white cover (like dust or white powder).

What is this and how to avoid such mess?

A number of issues cause this, E.G. pressure in the can, temperature when you spray, distance of spray, and shaking/mixing the solution well.

I've tried different approaches - and as I understand this can is ruined. But how to avoid this in the future.

Yes, the can may also be defective. Everyone has there own way that works for them, so you will have to try out some and see what works for you best. I use to have similar problems especially with heat since I live in Nevada. I use Dullcote spray now and it works well. You can also use brush on varnish as this will eliminate the misting effect. I have tried Cryla soluble matt varnish and that does very well. I have heard you can use the brush on with an airbrush, so will post when I get around to that.

Humidity is your number one culprit for white dust whilst

spraying, it does it to chaos black too. The can ought to be fine, unfortunately you'll have to wait for a less humid day to do your spraying. Unless you have air conditioning that is...

Try using a large soft bristled brush (I have some cheap brushes from a watercolour set) to dust the model after the varnish has dried. When it happened to me I found most of the white dusting was just sat on the model, not stuck to it, and by giving it a brush it all came off.

That happened to me once, I just stopped using it when the humidity was too high (VA in the US). We have terrible humidity here during the Summers so whenever it's 75 and under percentage of humidity, I go spray. I use Krylon, though, so it can be sprayed at higher percentages. Never had a problem yet, with it! However, when I used the GW (used to use solely that), I had 1 mini turn completely white. I was so disappointed!

a quadrillion years ago, back when i still had a train set, i did weathering on them with those chalk pastels... just lightly scrape the top with a knife, and you have instant weathering powder, cheaply.:) again, prolly not the same as the expensive stuff, but always a route one can go. just remember to fix afterwards. :)

Well out here in the west there are many diatomite deposits so free siliceous chalk, just use some inks for coloring.

I have a few migs but have started to use ground down artist pastels. I have had a set sat around since college and since all my art and design is now all digital no point in saving them. They work just the same as the migs and even except a spray of dullcoat without disappearing (the
