A little while back Morland Studios released the excellent Aria and seals set which Wamp reviewed. They have now released a larger scale bust of Aria but does she measure up against the original?

The bust is a limited edition of 600 copies with each numbered out of the 600. She is 54mm scale and was sculpted by Patrick Keith whereas the original was done by Julie Guthrie. Patrick has done an excellent job of mimicking Julie's sculpt though there are slight differences in the details though to be honest it's not an issue at all. The sculpt is clean and simple and not overly fussy. The face is well done and the hair is arranged in a fluid movement which relates to the pose well. Her proportions sit well though and she has a nice stance about her. The bust itself sits onto a flat sculpted base depicting the water and two seals popping their heads from the water . This base is not attached which leaves you the option of whether to mount her upon it or not.

Aria is cast in white metal and is nice and solid. Casting quality is good, with little mould lines making clean up easy enough and assembly is also simple.

Priced at \$24.95 (around £16) she is about average on value, and is worth the cost.

All in all this is a nice piece, well sculpted and cast for a fair enough price. The sculpt doesn't quite have the delicate details of the small scale version but it's a lovely piece none the less and offers something different to the usual fare of elves and barbarians. It's a piece that will reward smooth flesh tones and offers some diorama opportunities.

Conclusion

Well worth a look at for something a little different



When

I was initially asked to write for

Portal I was very flattered, but also a little confused. Miniature painting and the preparation for doing so does sort of make up a large amount of the magazine. But then coming from a web forum dedicated to the art of miniature painting this is only to be expected. The trouble is I'm not a very good, or indeed very productive painter, something the editor knows only too well. When I reminded him about this, I did add that I could however ramble on about minis in a more general way. This seemed to do the trick, and so here it is, my first and probably last article for Portal.

But who are you, I hear you ask? Well it's no great mystery. My name is Tim and I own and run Miniature-Heroes, one of the many online miniature and gaming shops now on the web. Some of you may know the shop, and may even be customers. To others it may be a new site, but for the purposes of this article it doesn't really matter. What does is that I love miniatures and try to put this passion into what I do.

So you own and run a small website, is that it? Well no, I've been a fan of the little lead men for much longer than I've been running MH. I first got bitten by the bug back in 1984 having just started secondary school. Being very much a country bumpkin from a small village school of 150 pupils, to going to the local town school with over 900 was a bit of a shock. Uniforms, moving rooms for lessons, all the other kids, was a lot to take in. Worst of all was being made to stay outside in the yard all through the lunchtime break. I'm not sporty, and wandering about trying to find somewhere the wind and rain doesn't blow so much loses its appeal quite quickly. Clearly this wasn't good, I had to find another option.

I quickly discovered that if you went to a lunchtime club you

could stay inside. My first port of call was the chess club. Teacher regulated, so once you were in, you were in till the end of lunch break bell went, it was none the less a bit warmer and certainly drier than being outside. The drawback was I'm lousy at chess. Soon my marker was heading down the leader board at a rate of knots as I lost every match. Once again the appeal soon began to fade.

It was at this time that I heard of a Dungeons and Dragons club that was also run at lunchtimes, and it sounded interesting. I didn't know anything about D&D but I did like mythology and this sounded as close as I was going to get. Winter was also approaching so the die was cast.

Looking back it turned out to be a life changing decision, though I didn't know it at the time. The club wasn't teacher regulated, and just seemed to be run by a couple of other first years who were sort of peeping over an opened out Dungeon Masters Guide and a Players Handbook. These were the real old first edition types. I can still see the cover picture of the thieves trying to prise out the gem eye from the idol even now. Strangely I can't be alone in this as Richard Scott who owns Otherworld miniatures, has that very idol with thieves as part of a limited edition miniatures set. But then he's another old D&D buff too.

Anyway I was given a character, and with no idea what I was doing I joined in and quickly became hooked. Shortly afterwards I was given my first miniature. It was a Ral Partha barbarian, which I still have. I kept it in my pencil case for the rest of the day but it wasn't until the journey home that afternoon that it really started to occupy my thoughts. I liked it, and having always been a collector



of things I was starting to feel the pull of another collection coming on.

That first miniature has lead to a personal collection of over 1100, in numerous display and storage cases, and a life long obsession with what the uninitiated still refer to as my Dungeons and Dragons men. I continued to role play AD&D as it was back then till I left school. However I just never stopped collecting, and trying to paint the miniatures.

As you can see from the site I still have a love of the older miniatures, the ones I first saw in the Citadel Compendiums. These are the pre-slottas listed in the pre-owned section. I sell more modern things too, but I still only collect pre-slotta Citadel. Still that is a ramble for next time

Now that he paints his own figures I have been able to pursue my interests and although I can appreciate a decent figure from any genre I think traditional fantasy subjects are still my favourites, although I am partial to a bit of Steampunk at the moment. Over the last few years we have returned to roleplaying with a little AD&D and latterly Dark Heresy.

How often do you visit Wamp? I try to check WaMP most mornings as there's always something new to see or share, be it a new release, a WIP, an interesting technique or the latest stunning piece from one of the many talented painters who frequent the site.

EURO MILITARE By War Griffon 2011





The annual pilgrimage to Euro-Militaire got under way with a trip along British motorways on Friday 16th September, it was decided to have an extra night this year rather than an 'Oh My God its Early' start on the Saturday morning, the weeks leading up to the Euro weekend were their usual busy and manic selves as this year was my first year attending as a trader instead of just a member of the public.

n the Thursday, Freakinacage phoned me up and the conversation went as follows:

Freak "Good News"

Me "What"

Freak "I have Friday afternoon off now so we can travel down together"

Me "Bad news"

Freak "What"

Me "I am going down Friday morning as I am trading and will need to set up"

Freak "Oh ********

Other than that it was a good run down Friday morning and I was in Folkestone by lunch time and the afternoon was then

spent unloading and setting up ready to go for the following morning, I even remembered tickets this time...

One of the best parts about Euro-Militaire I think is the friendliness of the whole thing and everything revolves around the evenings social activities where there are hundreds of painters from all parts of the hobby sat around in the restaurants and bars of the hotels talking about the hobby itself and regardless of the number of times I have been to Euro I always manage to meet somebody new, this year was no different and I lost count of the people I met for the first time.

This year's show attendance seemed to be down, compared to previous years where you can't walk around the main trade hall without saying "excuse me please" to somebody in order to get past but it didn't stop the people from entering the competition giving the judges over 800

entries to spend their Saturday afternoon and evening judging. I feel this deserves a special mention because judging at Euro-Militaire isn't just a couple of people it is actually around 30 selected volunteers who have all consistently won medals at Euro-Militaire and other shows around the world and these iudges are selected from across the world not just the UK. These guys and girls give up their free time to wander around the competition hall on the Saturday and Sunday making sure entries are not damaged or go missing as well as other roles during the day, some are even manning club stands or are traders with their own stands but regardless they will spend from 3pm on the Saturday judging the categories in teams and then picking a best in show entry and it is usually around 8pm that evening before they finish and can go

for something to eat and a beer.

Every show has people who will argue about the judges decisions but bear in mind at this type of show it is not a first past the post like it is at Games Day, it is the Open System where each entry is scored/judged by its own merits not against another model or a judge liking it or not and all judges in the team judging that category have their say on the matter and if needed there is a head judge who's decision is final. I therefore fail to understand why some people moan that the judges are not qualified because such and such a model didn't place or call into question the judges qualifications to be able to judge!! All the judges on the day have cabinets set aside with their own work inside for people to view, they are also available all day on the Sunday in the competition hall to answer people's questions and give positive feedback to those that wish it. Yes we can



all sav "why did that get an award but that didn't?" but what we need to remember is that we are viewing the entries from a couple of feet away and in one or two directions depending on where we are standing whereas the judges are actually viewing the entries in their hands in order to get a proper view. How many times have you been to a show and taken a photo of a figure that looked good from a couple of feet away only to enlarge it on the camera or in Photoshop when you got home and think to yourself "Jeeze, why did I take a photo of that its terrible!!"

One thing was noticeable again though and that was the number of entries that are being painted for the light of a specific venue or for the camera, I am not sure I agree with this to an extent because you see these figures at different shows and as we all know not

all shows have harsh sun light streaming in off the English Channel, a figure can win a gold at Euro because of this but taken to another show it may not even place and it is then blamed on the judges...I hope this trend does not continue as I really don't think it is necessary for the shadows on skin to be black (just my own thoughts).

Enough on the complexities of judging I think, lots of traders had new models on show and for sale, Zeus from Alexandros was popular as was Stormtroopers stand and The Basements range of busts, the Chris Clayton sculpt of the Minotaur is beautiful and if you get the chance I recommend not letting this one slip away. Another that caught my eye was a new company (I think they were new) who were sharing the Pegaso Stand called La Ruota Del Tempo, they had some nice little busts for sale as well as some other kits but one that really caught my



eye and I fell in love with was Princess Nabila, I spent all weekend tracking down the trader, he hadn't arrived early like everybody else on Saturday morning and Saturday afternoon he was away from the stand as he was judging so it was Sunday morning when I finally got my hands on this piece but she was worth it.

Having mentioned Pegaso, they were in their usual location right at the bottom of the stairs and they had some new busts that are due out in the next two months, one of which is a Korean Warrior and a very nice 75mm Germanic Warrior, well I couldn't walk past and not take those two home with me could I??? Shopping was good although as I

was also trading myself this was snatched where possible in quiet moments or before the public were allowed in and as a bonus I managed to out shop Captain Sprout again, I know it's not a competition but it is fun...

Because I enjoy Euro so much one of the decisions I made this year was to forego Games Day UK, it was a decision that was not made lightly and not really an easy decision as I have always enjoyed both shows, however as I am sat typing this report (yes I know it is a week late) it is a decision I am glad I made, for the savings I made from not going to Games Day paid for two nights hotel costs a couple of pints of Guinness and my tickets into Euro for the





weekend (I bought these before the decision to trade was made) and looking at the Games Day reports throughout the day and from what friends have e-mailed me I think I made the right choice.

Quite a few WAMP members made the trip to Euro for the first time this year some were rewarded with medals but regardless of whether they won something or not talking to them throughout the day Sunday one thing was common, they had a really good time and would definitely be attending next year as well. Friday night saw a large group of us going for an all you can eat Chinese meal and Saturday night saw 12 of us all going for fish & Chips at Papa's where we went last year.

various basing products as well as recently acquiring the rights to Eolith Miniatures (now sold under the name of War Griffon Miniatures). MDP's Pro Pigment set offers another string to their bow and here I will take a look at how they perform.

offerina

There are 12 different powders available. These can be purchased separately at £3 for a 20ml pot which is slightly more than equivalent Vallejo powders but only a little more. If you opt for the full set of 12 at £30 they work out cheaper than the Vallejo's anyway.

The colour choice is good with regular colours like Red Oxide and various Sienna's and earth tones. Yellow Ochre is a nice bright colour and coupled with the addition of Titanium White the set offers some brighter options though I personally would love to see brighter pigments available such as purples and greens though that's a general wish not directed just at this range!! MDP will be releasing a further 3 colours soon to compliment the range (Graphite and two green earth's)

All the pigments come in a handy little

plastic pot with screw lid. Each has an easy to see colour co-ordinated lid which makes them easy to select the colour your looking for, it's a nice little touch.

The powders are all made from finely ground natural earth pigments and the first thing I noticed was they seem much finer than the Vallejo's. They tended to clump less which helped with application.

The powder is easy to apply, whether that's in a dry form just dabbed on with a brush or in a wet form. Various methods give you a wide range of effects and some experimentation can really reap the rewards of what you can get out of these.

Application is certainly less messy than using the Vallejo's pigments which is a great plus point and helps stop cross contamination via your work surface.

All in all this is a great product. While more expensive than equivalents it's only a few pence for a pot that will last you years and if you opt for the full set they are actually cheaper. The quality is good and the colour choice is great and it all adds up to a product I will continue to use at the expense of my other brand pigments.





So Christmas is just around the corner, and its time to buy friends and family pressies. So its that time of year where we trawl through, ebay, online shops and if you're really keen down to town and the shops. Some of you are probably thinking Christmas, but its early, well GET OVER IT, I plan all my seasonal shopping in advance, so that I'm not rushing around like a mad thing a week before the big day... or in the case of some of you lazy so-and so's, Christmas Eve.

So what potentially are some of the best buys available right now, and how late do I leave it. Well if you're as organised as me when it comes to Christmas, you've already started making purchases. This year I've been looking for bargains online and on ebay, so far I've been pretty lucky and managed to bag a few cool presents, which I can't say what, just in case one of my family members decide to read this old rag.

So what's out there that could be a tempting present for a gamer friend or family member. First up is the new board game from Games Workshop; Dread Fleet, most old ancient gamers such as myself will remember this as Man-O-War back in the far forgotten past. With updated rules, new name and some really cool miniatures, this has potential for being a good game,



though at £70 that might put some of off spending your hard earned cash.



So if Pirates and all things nautical are you're bag then you're going to want to check out the new offering from Black Scorpion Miniatures new rule system Cutlass, 28mm skirmish war game with a fantasy background. As well as the rules they have some really nicely sculpted miniatures to go along side,

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which include some cool Dwarven Pirates, as well as Orcs and the Undead all going varrrrrrrrr.....



Now we move into space and pop over to the Mantic world of Warpath. Yep, these guys have brought out a Sci-fi game to go up against GW's 40K and the first offering are the Forge fathers and Orcs under the name of Marauders. The Forge Fathers are basically space dwarves or for all you veteran 40Kers Squats, yep, someone has finally brought back squats...This rule system will be interesting to follow as it has former GW veteran designer Alessio Cavatore working on them, so it'll be interesting to see how they develop over the coming year. I'll be keeping my eye on this system in terms of miniatures, as there is potential for some really cool looking vehicles in the offering during 2012. There is also the release of 2nd edition Kings of War rulebook for all you fantasy gamers, and no doubt there will be some new releases to tempt you over the coming months.

Wizards of the Coast have a new boardgame using the same mechanics as the previous releases, Legend of Drizzt. The game is centred around one of D&D's more famous character's, created by author R A Salvatore. You get to battle dangerous foes, in attempt to win fame and fortune. The game is designed for 1-5 players, yeah this can be played solo. I already have a copy of Wrath of Ashardalon, which is a really great game to play, so



this should be equally good and well worth picking up a copy. Drizzt can be combined with all previous D&D Adventure System Cooperative Play board games, including Castle Ravenloft and Wrath of Ashardalon. These games come with some really nice sculpted hard plastic figures, 42 in total, all of which are nice to paint up for all those painters out there.

Over at Ganesha Games they've just released a new set

of historical rules. Flashing Blades, based on the Songs of Blades and Heroes rule system. Flashing Blades allows skirmish gaming from the late renaissance to the Golden Age of Piracy. You only need between 5-15 minis for a game, which means you can get playing very quickly without having to paint rows and rows of miniatures. The great thing about the SBH rule system is its simplicity, it's really quick and easy to pick up and play.



If you're a steam punk fan then you may be tempted by Leviathans (www.monstersinthesky.com). This simulates combat between warships that have taken to the air in an alternate history/steam punk 1910. It's a board game/ war game, the core rule set contains two small fleets, British and French, allowing you to battle in the air straight away. There will be expansion sets for each of the two powers, with more planned in the future. It's not available to buy just yet, as it's in the printing stage, but fingers crossed this will be in the shops for Christmas.




Soda Pop Miniatures have a interesting board game and accompanying miniatures called Super Dungeon Explore. The miniatures are not your normal looking 28mm miniatures. but are more like cartoon characters, nicely sculpted, these miniatures are fun and great for painting. The game is your typical dungeon delve, fight monsters, ransack the gold and gems and generally trawl through the dungeon causing mayhem. You can play as a member of a party of adventurers

or as the dungeon's dark consul and take command of the monster horde. The box set contains 50 highly detailed miniatures and well worth picking up just for those.


Our next stop is Warheads; Medieval Tales, this is an RPG skirmish game from Urban Mammoth. I really like this game and love the miniatures, it's fun to play and the miniatures are great to paint. The rule books come in A5 books, which are nicely laid out, easy to read with cool art work. What I really like are the animal miniatures that are available everything from rabbits through to stags. It's set in Medieval England, but a fictional version. Slightly tongue in cheek this is a great game to introduce youngsters to the idea of table top gaming. Its definitely well worth checking out, even if it's just to paint some of the great minis. The latest rule book introduces the world of the Vikings, which means there's some really cool miniatures to go with it.

Elven Princess

This Elven Princess is tall, lithe, willowy, and graceful- in short, everything an Elven princess should be, but is she a good miniature?

Cast in white metal, this figure comes in 2 pieces- the body and the left hand holding her staff. There are very fine mould lines that are easy to remove and some gate tags around the base that are easy to get rid of. The base is cast in place and would be very difficult to remove if you desired, but the real disappointment is that it's very plain and doesn't stand up to some of the other bases we've seen with this company- it almost seems to be an afterthought with this mini.

The staff is a problem. It's wire thin and bends so easily that you'll be better off cutting it away and replacing it than trying to get it straight again. The wrist of the left hand is also so thin that attaching it to the arm correctly is a big challenge.

There are a lot of details on this figure that would make it fun to paint. There's a pretty even distribution of skin, hair, and cloth; along with a number of small details that you could focus on to really make her pop. She's a beautiful figure-there are enough pictures of well painted versions to prove that.

Some of the lines on the skirt are too

straight and don't flow with the general fall of the fabric that they've sculpted. There's also a strange line along the back of the skirt that makes it look like she has some sort of short mantle draped over the skirt. In the studio paint job they deal with this line by making it look like you're seeing her underwear through the fabric. That's one way to handle it, but it just sticks out strangely to me.

There are a lot of female elves out there to choose from. Compared to many, this one is very static. The costume design of this figure gives her a more alluring and exotic appearance, where most competitors have versions in armour, full robes with magical elements, etc. But, while she is very nice, there's really nothing to make her stand out in the crowd.

NeatPete

This mini is pretty nice, but not up to what I would consider normal Dark Sword standards. While still being nice, there are a couple let downs for me. The trim on her dress is sculpted to have a triangle lined texture. This would normally be awesome but on my copy, it's rather rough in some spots. After I get a layer of primer on it, I fear the detail would be lost creating a tough textured trim to paint. Secondly, on the back as the skirt hangs down her booty, the folds don't connect to anything and it looks as though the sculptor started sculpting folds at the top and bottom and didn't connect them in any way. It creates this awkward ridge that catches my eve. Her staff is another feature that would cause me trouble. It's very thin. Thinner than the stuff I pin minis with - and that stuff is thin! I'd never be able to touch the staff in a gaming session with my hands and have it maintain it shape. Lastly, my copy had a casting shift on her right jaw up to her cheek that may be tough to get, even with the tiny files.

Now let's keep in mind this mini is still pretty nice despite the items I previously mentioned. The female features are surely emphasized here. Her arguably reasonably proportioned breasts top a nice, flat stomach that sports a gorgeous chained "waistband"? (is that what one of those fancy 'Janet Jackson necklace for your waist' is called? Maybe "waistlace"? Any help on this ladies?) The detail on this is so perfect I wonder how other parts of this mini weren't so fine. If you are looking for a mini with great stomach ornamentation this is her. She has a great positioning as well. Her hand is on her hip and head tilted to the side almost daring you to make her use her staff. Her hair is also nicely sculpted and cast flowing down her shoulders and back.

shanerozzell

When I received the box of Dark Sword Miniatures to review the Elven Princess was one that I just had a quick glance at, thought she was just another rpg gaming miniature then moved on. Since then I have seen a few images of painted versions but not really paid much attention to it until I picked her out for this review.

First up is the pose of the miniature; she's stood in a cocky, proud stance with her right-hand resting on her hip, in her left-hand is a staff topped with a crystal and she is sightly turning to the right with again an proud face. Mr Grace has got the proportions of the miniature perfect. The flow of her dress suggests some very thin fabric and her long flowing hair is very well done.

The miniature comes in two parts, her left-hand and staff separate from the rest of her and like all DSM the base is integral to the miniature. People seem to either love or hate the integral base but DSM make theirs pretty plain so they can be easily blended into one of your own making. The

sculpt of the Elven Princess is very well done with a lot of detail that has followed the original artwork faithfully.

The cast is very nice and up to DSM usual standard. the only flash on the version I have is a small amount at the bottom of the haft of her staff and another small amount on the hem of her dress. There are a few mould lines but most are going to be easy to clean-up apart from one which is across the right of her face. To be fair it's very thin and curved in a way which should be okay to carefully scrap away with a sharp craft blade. Pinning her left hand to her left arm will also need some care simply because of the thinness of her arm.

Captain Sprout

This is a two piece miniature by Jeff Grace in the classic dungeons and dragons style; there are many painted examples and its clearly a bit of a favourite for painters. Jen Haley has created such a stunning version of this Princess with her studio paint job that it's hard to see past that to the model itself..in hand however it's not quite as impressive and it left me feeling it's a wondrous paint job on an average figure. Why so harsh? Well.. lets see...

The mini comes in a different style of packing material to the other Dark Sword miniatures I have seen, this one is a lighter brown, with Masterworks on it and a seductive looking woman on one side of it. I find it a bit over done and prefer the other brown packing material, but it's not the most important part of the mini and it is as sturdy as the usual fare.

The mini depicts a female 'elven princess' holding a staff in one hand..it appeared on first analysis to have some sort of candle on top of it but I confess that after looking at it for a while I was still not sure what it was. It's not badly sculpted but it is a little strange. Fortunately there was a paint job to refer to, which made clear the staff is a metal holder with some sort of crystal in it.

The mini is in two parts, the mini on the integral base and the hand with staff.

The staff is cast in metal and on my version was completely bent like a banana, all the way back on itself and a little too thin to be of much use. The picture on the Dark Sword website shows the mini with a piece of wire metal in hand and the modeller would do well to replace the packaged staff with something similar. The staff has the hand cast on it so some detail surgery and small drilling and filing will be needed to ensure any replacement looks the part.

Cleanup is ok though there are a few flash and mould lines about the place and the fine filigree runs across a couple of them..a careful modelling hand will be required but nothing beyond any other model and there is not much to stick together. The staff replacement / issues with the metal are the main cause of concern in cleanup and assembly and will



require more skill than just sticking the two bits together might.

The mini is posed pausing and looking off to one side in a static position and I liked the anatomical stance overall, it's less 'alluring' than the concept art but in my view that's no bad thing as the concept art is all hips and ears. The pose is good and the proportions seem to be right.

I've reviewed a couple of other figures in this range with complex drapery and again the work on the skirt and folds seems overdone and the material not as light as it might be. The drapery and folds don't flow naturally and as a result they make the skirt look heavy and exaggerated..perhaps that

is why it looks like it is falling down a bit. The arrangement on the rear of the skirt doesn't enable easy explanation, there are lots of layers but I am not sure what they are all for.

The head is a classic fantasy shape in this genre with over wide eyes but they look better on an elf than a human in many respects. They can be disguised with a careful paint job and it is a bit of a marmite look, if you like this genre and style this won't bother you, but it's not to my general taste.

The integral base (love them, hate them, this one has one) will be difficult to remove neatly and so is better integrated into a larger whole if you want to use something else. Otherwise the broccoli is fairly featureless and bare and a bit nondescript. In my view this is one the model could have done

without. It has no additional features and the model doesn't rely on it for the stance or pose.

This is an old school mini that has had some amazing paint jobs but I couldn't bring myself to like it very much..the staff and the casting don't do it any favours and although it is very nice in parts, those parts are not numerous enough to enchant me. It's not very striking and I think it will have sold a lot to people admiring the paint jobs rather than the model itself.

If slightly scantily clad elven women are your thing this is one, but it's not stand out enough to attract much attention except for real collectors of the school.

Cregan Tur

Quality: 8.0 / 10, minor mould lines and gate tags. Very plain base and staff is far too thin and bends easily.

Assembly: 8.0 / 10, it's only two pieces, but the wrist is very hard to properly position.

Value: 8.5 / 10, at \$7.99, she's a great value.

Overall: 8.1 / 10 the assembly issue is something to consider with this miniature, but I don't think it should drive anyone away from purchasing it. The price is extremely reasonable for a high quality figure. It's not the best work this studio has done, but it's far from the worst. If you want a beautiful female elf, then you should consider this one.

NeatPete

Quality: 7/29, nice concept pose and sculpting, a few casting and other issues hold it back IMO.

Assembly: 6.5/10, there's a couple spots that would be rough to get to and the staff would be pretty fiddly to get correct and keep that way if you plan on touching ever again.

Value:9/10, for eight bucks she's a very nice mini.

Overall: 7.5/10, fantasy female Elven caster with some issues but rather sexy and standy. Lots of minis out there like this and she gets lost among them for me.

shanerozzell

Quality: 9/10, The Elven Princess is a beautiful miniature that has been very well sculpted and is possibly my favourite sculpt from Jeff Grace to date.

Assembly: 8/10, no major dramatic mouldlines and all well with reach. Pinning will need care.

Value for Money: 10/10, at \$7.99 (£5.68) DSM produce superb miniatures for very little money and the Elven Princess continues that tradition.

Overall: 9/10, the Elven Princess is a very nice understated miniature with great pose and detail. One for the display painter.

Captain Sprout

Quality: 7 / 10, the sculpting is good enough but there are some casting issues and mould lines and the staff is unusable on my copy.

Assembly: 7 / 10, in just two parts the issue with the staff will cause a headache in assembly for non-expert modellers.

Value: 8 / 10, the mini retails at \$7.99 (£4.50 approx) which is good value for a metal mini of this type and size.

Overall: 6.5 / 10, I didn't find this mini up to the usual DSM standard.. it has some nice features but it doesn't blend all of them into a wonderful whole. The staff is an issue and it's a bit all over the place in terms of style. The drapery is a bit unusual and the general appearance doesn't feel fitting. The head and hair (if you like wide eyes) are the best bits and if you want a tiny mini to practice faces on this is a good canvas. The rest of it isn't so attractive I am afraid. The mini seems a bit like the packing..lots of promise at a glance, not as great when looked at in detail.

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Minipainting Wiki is a community project set up to create a place of information on all aspects of miniature painting and it's related aspects. The content is entirely driven by you the users. Each month in Portal we will highlight some of the information people are adding to the wiki.

The more information we can gather the better, anything from details on painting contests, tools, painting and sculpting techniques, clubs, games and even famous painters, sculptors and miniature companies. You can add as little or as much as you like from a single sentence to entire pages of useful content, its all welcomed from everyone.

Here's just a few of the things added over the months.

Paintbrush

A paintbrush is the most common tool used to apply paint to a surface. It is typically constructed from a wooden handle, metal ferrule and bristles. Bristles can be made from a variety of materials, both synthetic and natural.

Synthetic Brushes

Synthetic brushes are usually made with nylon and whilst they have traditionally been eschewed by miniature painters in favour of natural brush heads, recent technological developments and the fact that synthetic brushes are easier to clean and longer-lived than natural ones are bringing synthetic brushes back into mainstream use. One of the world's foremost miniature painters, Natalya Melnik of the Russian Federation, is known for using exclusively synthetic brushes.

Natural Brushes

Natural materials include Kolinsky sable, Hogs Hair, Goat or even Squirrel. Natural brushes, and sable in particular, tend to be favoured by miniature painters, even though such brushes, in the art world, are mostly used for watercolours rather than acrylic. This is due to the much smaller quantities of paint used in miniature painting and the fact that it is typically diluted so that the distinction between miniature painting techniques and water colours is not as great as might be imagined.

Brush Sizes

Brushes come in a variety of sizes. The full range runs from 10/0, 7/0 (also written 0000000), 6/0, 5/0, 4/0, 000, 00, 0, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 16, 18, 20, 22, 24, 25, 26, 28, 30. Brushes as fine as 30/0 are manufactured by major companies, but are not a common size. For all practical purposes, sizes from 3/0 up to 5 describe the typical banding of brushes for miniature painters.

Brush Shapes

Miniature painting brushes tend to be pointed at the end. However, there are other shapes of brushes used in miniature painting such as Tank Brush or Drybrush which are usually square tipped. Round tipped brushes may also sometimes be used to apply specialist effects such as weathering powders.

Object-Source Lighting

Object-source lighting or OSL is a painting technique where the light source is a fixed point (or points) near or on the miniature. The usual light source in OSL is an object on the miniature that one would expect to be casting light, which gives the technique its name. In contrast, miniatures are often portrayed with a light source which is far away, such as a sun directly overhead in the case of zenithal lighting.

It is common to use object-source lighting when the viewer would expect part of the miniature to cast light on other parts, such as when there is a torch or campfire present, or a powerful spell effect. Object source lighting can be used alone, when the object(s) casting light are the only sources of light present, or can be combined with other light sources like zenithal lighting. It is also common for the object source lighting to represent an object casting colored light, such as a torch casting a warm glow, or an arcane spell effect casting blue or green light.

To paint OSL, the goal is to simulate the effect of a light source with paint. Objects closer to the light source should be lit more brightly than objects far from the light source, and only objects with an unobstructed line to the light source should be lit, so shadows will be cast directly away from the light source.

A classic example of object-source lighting is Victoria Lamb's diorama, The Rescue of Sister Joan.

Room for your lamps and storage...I have all my drawers with bits and WIPs at the back of the desk and my lamps screwed to the table in between them. I don't use a paint holder as the cats would play havoc with it, but enough room for a big cutting mat and then on each side your trays or boxes of tools in use is my favourite thing.

I like to use a bluey grey - something like GW space wolves grev

Orki:

As a useful tip to discovering good highlight (and shade) colours, before I start painting the mini I usually slap a large blob of my chosen mid-tone onto my pallet, then surround it with little blobs of various highlight colours which I wet blend into the mid-tone to compare the results. Repeat with darker tones on another part of the palette to suss out your shade tones and you're done. You can always of course use multiple tones too, and the resultant 'map' on the palette will reveal all sorts of useful ideas and combinations.

Do this on some bits of paper instead of your palette if you want to keep a record of your mixes, and you can easily write notes on there too.

Spectral Dragon:

Would the use of a colour wheel be useful in finding out shades/highlights? I seem to remember a few people

mentioning this on another forum.

Darklord:

I have one and find it handy. Colour Wheel



Hobby Hazards


